Bypolls: Liquor shops to be shut

HYDERABAD: In view of the bypolls to the Telangana Legislative Council from the Warangal-Khammam-Nalgonda graduate constituency to be held on May 27, Rachakonda Police Commissioner Tarun Joshi issued an order to shut liquor outlets across the Yadadri-Bhongir zone from 4 pm on May 25 up to 4 pm on May 27. Clubs, star hotels and restaurants possessing different categories of licences will also not be allowed to sell alcohol.

WB braces for cyclone Remal

KOLKATA/NEW DELHI: A depression in the Bay of Bengal is likely to concentrate into a severe cyclonic storm and make landfall along the adjoining coasts of West Bengal and Bangladesh around Sunday midnight, bringing heavy rain in the coastal districts of the State and in north Odisha, the Met department said. This is the first cyclone in the Bay of Bengal this pre-monsoon and will be named Remal. (REPORT PAGE 8)

The Supreme Court on Friday refused to issue directions to the Election Commission (EC) on an NGO's plea for uploading polling booth-wise voter turnout data on its website during the Lok Sabha elections and favoured a "hands-off attitude" amidst an ongoing electoral process.

A vacation Bench of Justices Dipankar Datta and Satish Chandra Sharma adjourned the hearing on the application filed by the Association for Democratic Reforms and said it will be heard with the NGO's writ petition filed in 2019 after the Lok Sabha elections.

B'desh MP murder: CID arrests butcher

KOLKATA

The West Bengal CID arrested one person from the State's Bongaon area in North 24 Parganas district for his alleged involvement in the "murder" of Bangladesh MP Anwarul Azim Anar, an officer said

on Friday. The man, a butcher by profession, admitted during interrogation that he helped the other accused in chopping the victim's body before disposing the parts in different locations, the officer claimed.

The Bengal Police confirmed the murder the Anar, an Awami League MP from the Jhenaidah-4 segment in Bangladesh, on Wednesday after the victim went missing from Kolkata on May 13. State CID sleuths on Friday took the arrested person to the Bhangar area where the chopped body parts were put in plastic bags and scattered, he said. PT

KTR slams govt for targeting **BRS** cadre

BRS working president KT Rama Rao on Friday questioned officials on filing false cases specifically targeting BRS cadre while ignoring the real culprits.

He pointed out that no action was initiated against those who initially posted the alleged new logo of the TGSRTC, but only against BRS cadre, who were targeted for just sharing it and raising questions.

"Why are you not filing cases against the Congressaffiliated handles and media houses such as NTV, Big TV and Velugu? They are the ones who started showing the new RTC logo," he asked Director General of Police Ravi Gupta and Telangana State Road Transport Corporation (TGSRTC) Chairman and Corporation Managing Director VC Sajjanar, emphasising that these were the primary sources of misinformation.

Taking to X on Friday, Rama Rao expressed anger over biased enforcement, warning that if the harassment continued under the influence of political leaders, legal action would be pursued.

"If you guys continue this harassment under the direction of political bosses, we **TAX ON PEOPLE"** will drag you to the court of law and make sure justice is delivered," the BRS working president asserted.

He also criticised Chief Minister A Revanth Reddy for spreading false information and questioned why "such a habitual fake news peddler" should not be jailed.

"Revanth manufactured a shameless lie that my relative got a Rs 10,000-crore Covid drug contract. The same joker created a fake narrative that I dug up Nizam's jewels, which were under the Secretariat. Revanth circulated a fake video of union Home Minister Amit Shah. Being a Chief Minister, he posted a fake circular of Osmania University," he pointed out.

HYDERABAD: BRS working president KT Rama Rao on Fri day said the people of Telangana were burdened with a fresh tax called BRU tax, named after Bhatti Vikramarka, Revanth Reddy and Uttam Kumar Reddy All Cabinet members, including the Chief Minister, were collecting separate taxes unofficially and filling the pockets of their Delhi bosses, he said. "We had already warned that we will be cheated if Congress comes to power. But the people believed their promises. Within six months, our warnings are prov-ing to be true. Flyer tries to open aircraft door mid-air

The Rajiv Gandhi International Airport (RGIA) police has issued a notice to a passenger in connection with an incident involving the latter allegedly attempting to open the door of an aircraft mid-air.

The passenger, identified as Anil from Gajularama-ram in the city, was flying from Indore in Madhya Pradesh to Hyderabad recently when the incident

occurred. Though the reason was unknown, Anil allegedly tried to open the door when the aircraft was still in the air. However, the cabin crew and co-passengers stopped him.

On arriving at RGIA, the airliner staff lodged a complaint with the police, who booked a case.

The police also issued a notice under Section 41 of the Code of Criminal Procedure to Anil asking him to appear before them to record his statement.
