Cong govt yet to submit flood report: Centre

In sharp contrast to Chief Minister A Revanth Reddy's claims of the State government moving proactively to ensure speedy relief to the flood-hit, the Ministry of Home Affairs has said the State government was yet to submit a situation report on the flood, besides requisite documents for the release of the Centre's share of the State Disaster Response Funds.

In a letter to Chief Secretary A Santhi Kumari on Tuesday, Ministry of Home Affairs Disaster Management Division Director Ashish V Gawai asked the State government to submit the details in established procedure.

Since August 31, some districts were facing a flood-like situation and were reported to have been adversely affected due to heavy rain. However, as per the established procedure, no formal situation report was received so far in the MHA Control room, he

Ministry of Home Affairs says TG govt has not submitted requisite documents for release of Centre's share of SDRF either

said. As reported by the State Accountant General, Rs 1,345.15 crore was available in the State Disaster Response Fund (SDRF) account as on April 1, 2024, for the management of relief in the affected areas during 2024-25.

"It has been observed from our records that the State government has not submitted requisite information for the release of Central share under the SDRF for the current financial year," he said, adding that the second installment of the Central share of SDRF of Rs 188.80 crore for 2022-23 was released to the State government on July (SEE PAGE 2)

2 Hyd youth among 4 Indians killed in US

Four Indian students, including two from the city, were killed in a multi-vehicle crash in Texas, United States, on Friday afternoon.

The victims are Aryan Raghunath Orampati from Kukatpally, Farooq Sheikh from BHEL, and Lokesh Palacharla and Darshini Vasudevan from Tamil Nadu. They were travelling to Bentonville when the accident occurred.

They connected through a carpooling app for their journey. The collision occurred just past White Street around 3.30 pm on

Friday. According to reports, Aryan and Farooq, who reside in Bentonville, were returning home after visiting the former's relative in Dallas.

Lokesh was on his way to visit his wife and Darshini, who was pursuing a Master's degree from the University of Texas at Arlington, was on her way to meet her uncle in Bentonville, reports stated. The collision, involving

approximately five vehicles, occurred when a truck, reportedly travelling at high speed, failed to slow down and rear-ended the SUV in which the victims were

Tension in Jainoor, tribals torch vehicles

Tribals torched commercial establishments and houses of civilians while protesting against an auto-driver's attempt to rape and murder a tribal woman in Jainoor mandal centre, triggering a communal clash and tension on Wednesday

Around 5,000 tribals belonging to several parts of the district gathered in Jainoor mandal centre as part of a bandh call given by various tribal rights organisations condemning the incident, which was on August 31. They set around 50 commercial establishments, 15 vehicles, including five cars, and a house belonging to the accused person on fire. They also pelted stones on places of worship by barging into them and threw household appliances and groceries out of stores. Some unidentified persons reportedly looted goods from shops damaged by protesters. They also assaulted media persons, who were covering the protest, and damaged their cameras. Police personnel, sensing trouble, were helpless as the agitators

vandalised commercial establishments. In retaliation, about 100 members of another section burnt commercial establish-

ments of the opposite group. It was yet to be ascertained how many shops were damaged. Due to the conflict between the two communities, tension prevailed for around three hours

Large contingents of police force drawn from Adilabad and Nirmal districts were deployed to bring the situation under control in Jainoor mandal centre. Adilabad Superintendent of Police Gaush Alam camped in Utnoor mandal centre to monitor the situation.

The situation is reportedly under control now. About 20 cases have been booked against protesters for violence and arson. Tribal rights organisations called for a bandh of the district on Thursday, too, condemning the communal clash in Jainoor. On Tuesday, the accused

auto-rickshaw driver, Shaik Makdhum from Sonupatel village, was arrested for allegedly attempting to murder a 45-year-old tribal woman from Devuguda after trying to rape her at Raghavapur village in Jainoor mandal when she hired the three-wheeler to visit her parents at Soyamguda on August 31. He left her on the road between Raghavapur and Soyamgudam village when she raised an alarm. (SEE PAGES 2, 4)

Boko Haram militants kill over 100 in Nigeria

At least 100 villagers were killed in northeastern Nigeria when suspected Boko Haram Islamic extremists opened fire on a market, on worshippers and in people's homes, residents said on Wednesday, the latest killings in Africa's longest struggle

with militancy. Over 50 extremists on bikes rode into the Tarmuwa council area of Yobe State on Sunday evening and began firing before setting buildings ablaze, according to police. AP
