'Turncoat' Arekapudi denies joining Cong

Fearing disqualification, the MLA says he is still with BRS

HYDERABAD

A day after the Telangana High Court issued directions for the Speaker to decide on the disqualification of three BRS MLAs who defected to the Congress, Serilingampally MLA Arekapudi Gandhi, who had joined the Congress in July, is apparently trying to use technical aspects to escape disqualification.

Gandhi, who won the 2023 Assembly elections from Serilingampally stituency on a BRS ticket, had along with a few corporators joined the Congress on July 13. Chief Minister A Revanth Reddy had formally welcomed him into the Congress by offering a party scarf in the presence of MLC Patnam Mahender Reddy and Government Advisor Vem Narender Reddy.

However, following the BRS opposing Gandhi's appointment as chairman of the Public Accounts Committee, a post that is usually given to an Opposition member, the MLA has now taken a 'U' turn and is claiming that he is still in the Op-

position. He also claimed that the scarf offered by the CM was not of the Congress but a general scarf, usually offered to people in temples!

"How can you say that I am with the Congress? During the meeting with the CM, he offered me a scarf, which is generally offered in a temple. Was it a Congress scarf? Did he offer a Congress scarf to me or the corporators? I am still in the Opposition and am I not eligible?" Gandhi asked in an interview to a television news

DEFECTED MLAS IN A SPOT OF BOTHER

HYDERABAD: After the High Court orders and Serilingampally MLA Arekapudi Gandhi's 'U' turn, the other MLAs who defected to the Congress from the BRS, are now in a spot of bother. In all, 10 MLAs, who won the Assembly elections on BRS tickets from different constituencies, joined Congress after the polls. However, after the defection of the first three MLAs, the BRS approached the HC, seeking disqualification of the turncoats. The court issued instructions to the Speaker on Mon-

day to initiate action on the defected MLAs within four weeks.

Already, the defected MLAs are facing tough times in their constituencies as local Congress leaders were treating them like 'untouch ables'. Jogulamba Gadwal MLA B Krishnamohan Reddy, Jagtial MLA Dr Sanjay Kumar, Patancheru MLA Gudem Mahipal Reddy, Chevella MLA K Yadaiah and others have been opposed by local Congress lead ers. These MLAs are now worried about their future. With lack of support from Congress cadre, they are apprehensive about their political career if they too are disqualified. The fear of disqualification is haunting them since Monday's directions from the HC could be cited as a prece-

Row over Rahul's Sikh remarks in US

WASHINGTON

Congress leader Rahul Gandhi accused the RSS of considering some religions, languages and communities of being inferior to others and said that the fight in India is about this and not about politics. The Leader of Opposition in Lok Sabha was addressing a gathering of several hundred Indian Americans in Herndon, a Virginia suburb of Washington DC, on Monday.

"First of all, you have to understand what the fight is about. The fight is not about politics. That is superficial," Gandhi said as he asked one of the Sikh attendees in the front rows to give his name. "What is your name, brother with the turban," he asked. "The fight is about whether a Sikh is going to be allowed to wear his turban in India or a kada in India. Or he, as a Sikh, is going to be able to go to Gurdwara. That's what the fight is about. And not just for him, for all religions," said the Congress leader.

Meanwhile, the BJP came down heavily on Rahul Gandhi over his remarks about the Sikh community, saying the Congress leader is trying to create a "dangerous narrative" by speaking on "sensitive issues" abroad. PTI

The Congress government's attempts to do away with schemes introduced by the previous BRS government, and in turn wipe out whatever imprints were left by former Chief Minister K Chandrashekhar Rao on the lives of the people of Telangana, might deprive lakhs of poor women of the Bathukamma sarees that they were getting for free from the government for the last six years.

The distribution of sarees, known as the Bathukamma saree scheme, was a crucial part of the women's nine-day celebration of the floral festival, which reflects Telangana's culture. With the BRS government promoting the

Bathukamma festival in a big way as part of its efforts to pass on crucial aspects of Telangana culture to future generations, the KCR regime launched the distribution of Bathukamma sarees to women as a gift in

The idea was to ensure that the women celebrate the festivities with joy, without having to worry about money to buy new sarees. Every year, nearly one crore sarees in nearly 30 designs and 20 different colours were distributed to women across the State. Experts from the National Institute of Fashion Technology were also roped in to design the sarees. The Bathukamma saree orders were also a blessing in disguise for weavers in the

The air quality in Hyderabad reached hazardous levels, according to a new report from Greenpeace titled 'SPARE THE AIR' 2nd Edition, which analysed 2023 air pollution trends. The findings reveal an alarming escalation in particulate matter concentra-

tions across the city. Hyderabad's air quality monitoring stations, positioned across 14 locations by the Central Pollution Control Board (CPCB) and Telangana State Pollution Control Board (TSPCB), paint a grim picture of air pollution.

The annual average values for PM2.5, the tiny but deadly particulate matter, were found to be five to six times higher than the World Health Organization revised guidelines at seven locations, including Central University, New Malakpet, and Somajiguda.

Alarming

In areas including Bollaram industrial area, IDA Pashamylaram, Kokapet, Sanathnagar and Zoo Park, these levels were an alarming seven to eight times higher than the WHO standards. The scenario is equally bleak for PM10, a larger particulate that poses severe health risks.


Protests continue in Imphal; govt bans internet, reimposes curfew in 3 districts

Defying the curfew, over a thousand students staged in imphal for the second day on Tuesday even as security forces lobbed tear gas shells and fired in the air to disperse the protesters, while the Manipur government banned mobile internet for five days to prevent spreading of fake and concocted

posts, photos, and videos. The students, who staged a demonstration in front of the Chief Minister's Secretariat and Raj Bhavan on Monday to protest the rising violence in the State, remained gathered overnight in the all-women Ima Market and locked themselves

Tuesday due to the reimposition of the curfew. Rejecting the persuasion of the senior police officers to return to their homes, the agitated students on Tuesday organised protests in front of the Manipur University even as the security personnel, deployed in large numbers, tried to disperse them. Tension prevailed in Imphal, due to the protests and the security

TAILS OF SOPHISTICATED ROCKETS RECOVERED

IMPHAL: Tails of sophisticated rockets have been recovered after recent drone attacks in Manipur, a top official said, Manipur Police dismissed claims of Lt Gen P C Nair, a retired DG of Assam Rifles, in a recent interview that no drones or rockets have been used in the attacks. He also labelled Manipur Police as a 'Meitei Police', indicating their alleged partisan role in the ethnic strife.

Govt to rope in 5,000 cyber commandos

In a major effort to tackle cvbercrime, union Home Minister Amit Shah unveiled several key initiatives on Tuesday, including launching a Cyber Fraud Mitigation Centre, a web-based module as a comprehensive data repository and portal for sharing cybercrime information, and deploying 5,000 "cyber commandos".

He urged cybersecurity agencies to use Artificial Intelligence (AI) to identify the modus operandi of criminals duping people of their

hard-earned money, spreading fake news and abusing women and children online. India hosts around 46 per cent or almost half of global digital transactions, making the job of these agencies "challenging", he said while delivering a keynote speech during the first foundation day celebrations of the I4C or Indian Cyber Crime Coordination Centre here. He also announced that the government aims to train 5,000 cyber commandos over the next five years to strengthen cyber defences across India.

Four major cyber platforms have been introduced the Suspect Registry, Cyber Commandos, Cyber Fraud Mitigation Centre, and

the Coordination Platform. He emphasised the importance of creating a Cyber Suspect Registry at the state level, which will serve as a crucial database in the fight against cybercrime. The Cyber Fraud Mitigation Centre will integrate police, financial institutions, and other agencies onto a single platform, while the Coordination Platform will enhance collaborative efforts to address cyber threats. With the rise in digital transactions, Shah underscored the necessity of robust digital security measures. IANS

The Telangana High Court on Tuesday set a threemonth deadline for the State government to complete a crucial empirical inquiry aimed at identifying politically Backward Classes and enumerating Backward Class voters in all local bodies across Telangana.

This directive follows the Supreme Court's judgement in the 'Vikas Kishanrao Gawali vs. State of Maharashtra' case. A division Bench of the Telangana

High Court, comprising Chief Justice Alok Aradhe and Justice J Sreenivas Rao, instructed Advocate General A Sudershan Reddy to adhere to the Supreme Court's guidelines outlined in Paragraph 13 of the Vikas Kishanrao Gawali judgement. The State government was asked to submit a compliance report to the

court within three months. The High Court's order came in response to three petitions filed in 2018, 2019 and 2020 by the Telangana State Backward Classes Welfare Association and in-

dividuals including Jajula Srinivas Goud and Dasoju Sravan Kumar. These petitions challenged the continuation of the local body election process without undertaking the mandated fresh identification of politically backward classes as required by the Supreme Court's earlier judgment in 'K. Krishnamurthy vs. union of India'. During the hearing in August, the petitioners' counsels highlighted that the SC issued updated orders in 2021, reaffirming the triple test conditions for OBC reservations.
