MUMBAI: Maharashtra recorded the second suspected fatality of Guillain-Barre Syndrome (GBS) with the death of a 56-year-old woman on Sinhagad Road in Pune. The woman died on Tuesday following respiratory failure with sepsis and was suffering from oral cancer. The total number of GBS cases in the State has risen to 127. The woman, who complained of weakness, was taken to hospital on January 15. IANS

STOCKHOLM: An Iraqi man who carried out several Quran burnings in Sweden has died, a judge in Stockholm said on Thursday. Swedish media reported that he was killed in a shooting in a nearby city. Salwan Momika (38) staged several burnings and desecrations of Islam's holy book in Sweden in 2023. Videos of the Quran burnings got worldwide publicity and raised anger and criticism.

All 64 onboard US plane feared dead in collision with chopper

28 bodies pulled out from Potomac river after midair collision in Washington

ARLINGTON

All 64 people aboard an American Airlines jet that collided with an Army helicopter were feared dead in what was likely to be the worst US aviation disaster in almost a quarter century, officials said on Thursday.

At least 28 bodies were pulled from the icy waters of the Potomac River after the midair collision Wednesday night when the helicopter apparently flew in the path of the jet as it was landing at Ronald Reagan National Airport near Washington, officials said.

were still Rescuers searching for any sign of the 60 passengers and four crew members, but they did not believe there were any survivors, which would make it the deadliest US air crash in nearly 24 years.

"We are now at the point where we are switching from a rescue operation to a recovery operation," said John Donnelly, the fire chief in the nation's capital. "We don't believe there are any survivors."

The body of the plane was found upside-down in three sections in waist-deep water. The wreckage of the helicopter was also found. Donnelly said first responders on Thursday were searching an area of the Potomac river as far south as the Woodrow Wilson Bridge, roughly 4.8 km south of the airport.

There was no immediate word on the cause of the col-

lision, but officials said flight conditions were clear as the jet coming from Wichita, Kansas, with US and Russian figure skaters and others aboard, was making a routine landing when the heli-

copter flew into its path.
"On final approach into

Reagan National it collided with a military aircraft on an otherwise normal approach," American Airlines CEO Robert Isom said. "At this time, we don't know why the military aircraft

Images from the river showed boats around the partly submerged wing and the mangled wreckage of the plane's fuselage.

tinues to rise, US President Donald Trump said that the accident "should have been prevented" and questioned why the authorities failed to inform the helicopter to divert its route.

Taking to his social media platform Truth Social, Trump posted, "The airplane was on a perfect and routine line of approach to the airport. The helicopter was going straight at the airplane for an extended period of time."

"It is a clear night, the lights on the plane were blazing, why didn't the helicopter go up or down, or turn. Why didn't the control tower tell the helicopter what to do instead of asking if they saw the plane. This is a bad situation that looks like it should have been prevented. Not good," he

"What a terrible night this has been. God bless you all!" Trump said in another post. IANS

People want KCR's return: Congress poll

An attempt by the Telangana Congress to insult the previous BRS regime by calling it 'farmhouse governance' through an online poll on X is boomeranging, with people calling for the return of the K Chandrashekhar Rao govern-

As part of an attempt to showcase the "support" extended to the State government by the people, the offi-cial handle of Telangana Congress, @INCTelangana, launched an online poll asking X users which governance they preferred.

The options were "A. Farmhouse governance" and "B. Prajala Vaddaku Palana", with the Congress calling itself the people's government. However, as voting progressed, the trend favoured what the Congress

tried to belittle by calling it the farmhouse governance, with more than 70 per cent of the voters calling for the return of the BRS led by Chandrashekhar Rao. Sharing a screenshot of

more than 70 per cent favoured the BRS regime, BRS spokesperson Putta Vishnuvardhan Reddy said the message was clear.

Many users laughed their hearts at the way the poll boomeranged on the Congress and wanted the details not to be deleted, with a few insisting that screenshots of the debacle be saved. There were a few, who criticised the Congress, asking it how many times it would face embarrassing moments.

BRS corporators arrested

BRS corporators, who protested during the Budget proceedings at the GHMC council meeting here on Thursday, were arrested. They were opposing

Mayor Gadwal Vijayalakshmi's decision to pass the Budget without discussion in the council meeting. BRS working president KT Rama Rao condemned the arrest of GHMC corpo-

rators, calling it an attempt to suppress voices questioning the Congress government's approach toward Hyderabad's development.

He criticised the arrests, stating that corporators were detained for raising concerns over the lack of funds for the city in the **GHMC Governing Council** meeting. "Is it a crime to question why Hyderabad is being ignored? If we ex-

posed the Congress government's failure to utilise last year's allocated budget, will they silence our representatives?" he asked.

Former Minister T Harish Rao also decried the arrests, calling the use of marshals to remove corporators from the Budget Council meeting undemocratic. "Approving a

Budget without discussion is unacceptable. Suppressing public representatives who speak for the people is intolerable," he said.

BRS leaders demanded the immediate release of arrested corporators and warned the State government against undermining elected representatives.

Inter hall tickets now on phones!

For their hall tickets, students appearing for the Intermediate examinations need not go all the way to the college. They can just download it on their phone!

BRS stages widespread protests against Cong rule

The BRS staged widespread protests across Telangana, and in the UK and Australia as well, charging the Congress government with failing to implement its 420 promises even after being in power for 420 days.

In response to a call by BRS working president KT Rama Rao, the party leaders and activists submitted petitions to statues of Mahatma Gandhi at various locations, urging him to grant wisdom to the Congress leaders to honour their poll promises.

The protests coincided with Mahatma Gandhi's death anniversary, with leaders pointing out key welfare schemes that remain unfulfilled, including

No domicile quota to hit medical students hard

Meritorious students from Telangana are set to lose their domicile-based reservations in Post Graduate (PG) medical seats from next academic year.

The change will allow students from other Indian States who have completed MBBS in Telangana to compete for super-speciality medical seats under the Competent Authority in Telangana.

The Supreme Court's judgment on Wednesday declaring domicile-based reservations in PG medical



seats as 'impermissible' also means that students from Telangana will lose all such reservations within the

A large number of students, public health experts and individuals closely following medical education said the apex court's judg-

ment would be unfair to native students, who have pursued MBBS elsewhere, while others have argued that this will only open op-portunities for meritorious students from across India.

The Supreme Court's judgment has also elicited arguments that South Indian States, with highly evolved medical education and higher number of PG medical seats, will struggle to maintain quality healthcare without the domicile reservation.

"Isn't it unfair to deny a candidate an opportunity in their native State, where they were born and raised,

just because they completed their MBBS in another State. How is it equitable to grant State quota benefits to students who have resided in the State only for five years and at the same time deny benefits for domiciled students?" asks Dr Sunil T, a Nalgonda native who did his MBBS in Karnataka.

Aravind Varier, well known for his data-analysis on social media platform X (@VarierAravind), said: "It would be difficult for South Indian States to maintain the quality of healthcare without domicile reservation for PG medical seats".
