#### Stage set for **Delhi polls today**

**NEW DELHI:** The stage is set for the high-stakes Assembly elections in Delhi, where the Aam Aadmi Party is eyeing a third straight term, while the BJP and the Congress are looking at resurgence. Over 1.56 crore voters are eligible to cast their ballots from 7 am onwards on Wednesday. Voting will take place across 13,766 polling stations in all the 70 Assembly constituencies to decide the fates of 699 candidates in a contest that could reshape the political landscape of the capital. **NATION PAGE 7**

# CM does another U-turn, this time on caste survey

Revanth says 42% quota for BCs requires an amendment to the Constitution

HYDERABAD

Chief Minister A Revanth Reddy, who promised 42 per cent reservations for Backward Classes (BC) based on the Social, Economic, Employment, Education, Political, and Caste Survey-2024, did another volte-face in the Assembly on Tuesday, refusing to table the complete report on the survey in the Assembly. More importantly, he stated that the 42 per cent reservation would require an amendment to the Constitution and not just the survey.

Rather than offering clarity, his statements exposed contradictions, raising serious questions about the government's political intent and execution of the survey itself, instead of a genuine attempt at social justice.

Participating in a discussion on his statement on the survey in the Assembly on Tuesday, Revanth Reddy, who had earlier projected the survey as a foundation for 42 per cent reservation for BCs, made a U-turn, admitting that such a move required a Constitutional

amendment. In a clear political manoeuvre, he promised 42 per cent ticket allocation to BCs in the upcoming local body elections, making it evident that the survey was more about political posturing than policy implementation.

Revanth Reddy went on to criticise the Samagra Kutumba Survey (SKS) report under the previous BRS government, questioning its legitimacy and data collection process. When the opposition, especially AIMIM floor leader Akbaruddin Owaisi, pointed out the hypocrisy, stating that while the Congress government slammed the BRS for withholding the SKS report, it was now doing the exact same thing by keeping the survey data off the Telangana government's official website, Revanth Reddy dodged an answer and refused to table the complete report.

When Opposition parties, including the BRS, BJP and AIMIM questioned the discrepancies in the data released by the State government, the Chief Minister sought to blame BRS chief K Chandrashekhar Rao along with former Ministers KT Rama Rao and T Harish Rao for not participating in the

### **Govt deceiving BCs, says KTR**

**HYDERABAD:** BRS working president KT Rama Rao lashed out at the Congress government for deceiving Backward Classes (BC) by failing to introduce a Bill for 42 per cent reservations in the Assembly, as promised in the Kamareddy BC Declaration meeting. He said the government made a mere announcement and avoided taking real legislative action. HYDERABAD: After facing embarrassment in the Assembly, the Congress government on Tuesday removed the Comprehensive Household Survey 2014 report from the official government website of MCRHRD Institute. The previous BRS government made the survey report publicly accessible for the last 10 years. The CHS report became a key issue during discussions on Chief Minister A Revanth Reddy's statement regarding the Social, Economic, Employment, Education, Political, and Caste Survey-2024 in the Assembly. # US deports illegal Indian immigrants

The United States is rigorously tightening immigration laws, the American embassy said on Tuesday amid reports that a US military aircraft is bringing some il-

legal migrants to India. The first round of deportation of illegal Indian nationals from the US comes around two weeks after Donald Trump became the US President for a second term. Trump has promised a strict policy approach in dealing with illegal immi-grants residing in the US and already signed a number of immigration-related executive orders. Asked about the deporta-

tion flight bringing back a group of illegal migrants to India, a US embassy spokesperson did not provide details, but asserted that Washington is removing illegal migrants. "I can't share any details on those inquires, but I can share, on the record, the US is vigorously enforcing its border, tightening immigration laws, and removing illegal migrants," the official said. immigration

#### **CHINA COUNTERS US TARIFFS**

**BEIJING:** China countered President Donald Trump's tariffs on Chinese products with tariffs of its own on multiple US imports on Tuesday. US tariffs on products from Canada and Mexico also were to go into effect on Tuesday, though Trump agreed to a 30-day pause on his threats against Mexico and Canada as they acted to appease his concerns about border security and drug trafficking. Trump planned to talk with Chinese President Xi Jinping in the next few days. This isn't the first round of actions between the two countries. China and US engaged in a trade war in 2018 when Trump goods and China responded in kind. (REPORT PAGE 9)

# 10 BRS turncoat MLAs get notices

In a fresh jolt to the 10 BRS MLAs who switched lovalties to the ruling Congress, the Assembly Secretary on Tuesday served notices seeking their explanation on the disqualification petitions filed by the BRS Legislative Party against them.

However, the MLAs are learned to have sought some time to respond after consulting legal experts. The move comes in the wake of the Supreme Court directing the Telangana Assembly

Speaker to set a reasonable timeline for ruling on the disqualification petitions and asked the Assembly Secretary to inform the court of the Speaker's decision within a week. The SC raised questions over the government's explanation of "reasonable time" for Speaker to take a decision on disqualification of the defectors. Defected BRS MLAs Tellam Venkat Rao, M Sanjay Kumar and others have confirmed to have received the notices and informed that they would respond after taking legal opinion.

### Low cotton vield drives farmer to end life

Low cotton yield reportedly forced a farmer to end his life by consuming village in Asifabad mandal on Tuesday. Asifabad Inspector Ravinder, in a statement, said Komram Poshaiah (55) died by suicide as he was depressed by the poor cotton yield. He had attempted suicide on Monday. He was shifted to a hospital in Mancherial. He breathed his last while undergoing treatment on Tuesday.

Poshaiah grew the cotton crop on his 10 acres of land. He was disheartened to register a dip in yield and consumed the pesticide when he was alone. At least eight farmers have died by suicide in Adilabad from December 1 to January 25. M Narsaiah, a 55-year-old farmer, ended his life by hanging as he was depressed over his inability to repay mounting debts at Varthamannur on January 25.

# Brace for hot and dry February

With the winter season almost making an exit, people in Hyderabad should prepare for dry weather condiions, including nigh da time temperatures and low humidity.

The early signs of this shift in weather pattern are clear with maximum temperatures in the State hovering between 34 degrees Celsius and 37 degrees Celsius. The near summer-like conditions, no humidity and relatively colder early hours of the day are expected to continue throughout February.

Weather expert from Hyderabad, T Balaji, who tracks even minute changes in weather patterns and issues alerts through platform X (@telanganaweatherman) says that February will be the driest month of the year. "The next 15 to 20 days will be driest days of this year with desert-type humidity, also there will be large variations in day and night temperatures," Balaji

# Ranikhet Disease deals blow to poultry farmers

A large number of chickens died of Ranikhet disease (RD), also known as Newcastle disease, causing financial losses to poultry farm owners.

The incidence of RD has been found in VM Banjar, Penuballi and Kallur mandal in Khammam district. Poultry farms at Payapur, Yagnanarayanapuram, Korlagu-Peruvancha, Vennavelli and other villages in Kallur mandal are

the most affected. Similarly, poultry farms near Bhadrachalam in Kothagudem district have also been affected. When contacted, the district veterinary and animal husbandry officer (DVAHO), Dr KV Narayana, informed that the disease has been found in the poultry farms located on the borders of Andhra Pradesh while the farms in other areas are not affected.

Officials sound caution It was first reported in

Penuballi mandal. Veterinary teams visited the farms, diagnosed the disease and advised farmers about the precautions to be taken to stop the spread of the disease as well as to dispose of the dead chickens. The disease was caused due

to the unhygienic conditions prevailing in the poultry farms. "The owners have to clean the bird litter and the farm area should be cleaned with sanitary liquids," he suggested. Dr Narayana, who is also incharge of Warangal and Hanamkonda districts, said that the RD cases are not found in those districts. The situation in Penuballi is also under control and the poultry farmers in other areas have been advised to follow safety measures.

Warden booked for

ture, one of the students informed the matter to his parents, who lodged a complaint with Karepally police a couple of days ago. The police booked a case under the POCSO Act and other relevant sections against Venkateshwarlu recorded the statements of the students harassed by the
