Bihar govt hikes old age pension

PATNA: Bihar Chief Minister Nitish Kumar on Saturday said his government has decided to increase the pensions of senior citizens, widows and people with disability by Rs 700 per month. The beneficiaries will now get an enhanced pension of Rs 1,100 from July, he said. "I am happy to inform you that under the Social Security Pension Scheme, all the elderly, disabled and widowed women will now get a pension of Rs 1,100.'

8 killed as hot-air balloon crashes

RIO DE JANEIRO: A hotair balloon caught fire and tumbled from the sky on Saturday in Brazil's southern state of Santa Catarina, killing eight people, firefighters said. Footage shared by local news outlet G1 showed billows of smoke coming from the balloon in flames as it hurdled towards the ground. Thirteen people survived and were taken to hospitals. Santa Catabrigade said, adding that 21 were on board.

Alternative roads project Attack on tribals at AOC in fast-track mode

Tender process for 2 roads at AOC Circle in Cantt in final stage

A proposal to construct two alternative roads at the Army Ordnance Corps (AOC) Circle, benefitting thousands of commuters in the north-eastern parts of Secunderabad, has entered the fast-track mode, with the tender process now in its final stage.

These roads were initially proposed in 2014 during the BRS government's tenure after local defence authorities frequently closed Allahabad Gate and Wellington Road, citing security concerns over their installations at AOC Circle. These closures caused major inconvenience to daily commuters.

The Greater Hyderabad Municipal Corporation (GHMC), in coordination with defence officials, has completed a joint survey to acquire defence land for the proposed routes—Safilguda Level Crossing to Entrenchment Road, and Safilguda Level Crossing to R K Puram Road Over Bridge (RoB). The tender finalisation is currently underway.

BRS slams Congress for 'reign of terror'

The alleged assault on Adivasi women by Forest officials at Iravendi village in Burgampadu mandal on Friday has snowballed into a major controversy, with the women lodging a police complaint and the BRS slamming the Congress government, accusing it of unleashing a 'reign of terror'.

According to the complainant, Madakam Sunitha, she and 11 other women were sowing cotton seeds in their podu lands when Forest officials, identified as Nagaraju, Rambabu and others, arrived to dig trenches. When questioned by the women, the officials allegedly beat them with hands and sticks, tore the clothes of one woman, Kunjam Jogamma, and attempted to molest them.

Sunitha said the women pleaded with the officials not to harass them, explaining that they had been cultivating the land for over 25 years and had no other livelihood. She urged the police to take action against the named officials, claiming the adivasi families were

As per reports, the incident took place when Deputy Forest Range Officer Nagaraju, beat officer Rambabu and other staff arrived with earthmovers to dig trenches on the disputed podu lands. The women said the officials were trying to forcibly take away the land they had been farming for decades and had threatened to demolish their homes with bulldozers. The Forest Department, however, claimed that its staff were attacked by the women, who tore their uniforms. Following the incident, residents of the hamlet met Pinapaka MLA Payam

facing threats to their lives.

BRS working president KT Rama Rao blamed the Congress, accusing it of failing to protect the dignity of women. DGCA raps AI for 'systemic failures'

The Directorate General of Civil Aviation (DGCA), in its order issued to Air India to remove three senior officials responsible for "serious and repeated lapses" in crew scheduling, has categorically mentioned "systemic failures in crew scheduling, compliance monitoring, and internal ac-

countability" at the airline. The DGCA identified following personnel as directly responsible for the continued non-compliance: Choorah Singh, Divisional Vice President; Pinky Mittal, Chief Manager-DOPS, Crew Scheduling; and Payal Arora, Crew Scheduling and Planning. These officials have been involved in serious and repeated lapses including but not limited to unauthorised and non-compliant crew pairings; violation of mandatory licensing and recency norms; and systemic failures in scheduling protocol and over-

spite lapses in licensing, rest, and recency requirements. These violations were discovered during the post-transition review from ARMS to the CAE Flight and Crew Management System," the DGCA order read.

The voluntary disclosures, while noted, point to "systemic failures" in crew scheduling, compliance monitoring, and internal accountability. "Of particular concern is the absence of strict disciplinary measures against key officials directly responsible for these operational lapses," it added. "Air India is directed to remove the above-mentioned officials from all roles and responsibilities related to crew scheduling and rostering. Internal disciplinary proceedings must be initiated against these officials

ICMR creates rare blood donor registry

NEW DELHI

The National Institute of Immunohaematology Mumbai, under the Indian Council of Medical Research, has for the first time created a national 'rare blood donor registry' for patients with rare and uncommon blood types who need frequent transfusions, especially in conditions such as thalassemia and sickle cell

takosh, a platform which currently provides information about blood availability, Dr Manisha Madkaikar, Director of ICMR-Centre for Research Management and Control of Haemoglobinopathies (CRHCM) in

Nagpur said. The integration will help people with rare blood groups easily trace blood banks and procure blood. It will also assist the blood

banks manage their stock and donors through a centralised system. India, with a population of more than 142 crore, has over 4,000 licensed blood banks, according to the Central Drug Standard Control Organisation (CDSCO). India relies heavily on transfusions due to a higher prevalence of blood diseases and complications during pregnancy, Dr Madkaikar said.

"Thalassemia itself contributes to 1 to 1.5 lakh patients who require recurrent transfusions," she said. Additionally, with more than 1,200 road accidents

occurring every day in India, and with every year 60 million surgeries, 240 million major operations, 331 million cancer-related procedures, and 10 million pregnancy complications, a serious call for blood transfusion is recognised, she said. In majority of blood banks, only ABO and RhD are antigens matched prior to cross-matching for issuing of red blood cell compo-
